

2) Rocky Point Bird Observatory

Position available: Banders needed

To work as a member of our team of banders, interns and volunteers at Rocky Point Bird Observatory (RPBO) in Metchosin, B.C. (near Victoria). The Bander is responsible for banding, processing and censusing birds, as well as recording, reviewing and proofreading all data according to the migration monitoring protocol and any other protocols established for the RPBO sites. The Bander will be required to work at both of the two migration monitoring sites and complete a variety of related assigned tasks. The Bander will typically work six days per week, for approximately 7 hours starting about 45 minutes before sunrise. As such, actual start and end times change over the course of the season. 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Protect Killer Whales & Salmon - Say no to Roberts Bank Terminal 2

For decades BC Nature and affiliated clubs have fought to keep the Fraser River Estuary healthy and intact. Now the proposed Roberts Bank Terminal 2 project is threatening not just the wetlands that support migratory birds but also the marine environment critical to Chinook salmon and Endangered Southern Resident Killer Whales.

Canada's own Impact Assessment Agency has concluded that habitat loss and estuary changes from the expansion of the shipping terminal will have significant adverse and cumulative effects on Southern Resident killer whales through:



- the destruction of legally protected critical habitat
- · reduced salmon availability
- increased underwater noise from a 25% increase in ships transiting the Salish Sea.

The damage to these species and their habitat cannot be effectively mitigated.

As the eyes, ears, hands and voice for nature in B.C. we are speaking out against the proposed Terminal 2 project. We ask that you also speak up for nature. Please tell the Minister of Environment and Climate Change, Jonathan Wilkinson and the federal cabinet, to say no to Roberts Bank Terminal 2 as part of a commitment to protecting restoring salmon and killer whales.

The following documents are open for a 90-day comment period. The public comment period ends on April 29, 2021.

Management Plan for the Georgia Basin Bog Spider (*Gnaphosa snohomish*) in Canada [Proposed]

The Georgia Basin Bog Spider is listed as Special Concern under SARA and is found in extreme southwestern British Columbia.

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Management Plan for the Peacock Vinyl Lichen (*Leptogium polycarpum*) in Canada [Proposed]

The Peacock Vinyl Lichen is listed as Special Concern under SARA and it occurs along the Pacific coast eastward to the foot of the coastal mountain ranges in British Columbia.

Management Plan for the Wandering Salamander (Aneides vagrans) in Canada [Proposed]

The Wandering Salamander is listed as Special Concern under SARA and is found in low-elevation forests on Vancouver Island and adjacent small offshore islands in southwestern British Columbia.

Management Plan for the Western Waterfan (Peltigera gowardii) in Canada [Proposed]

The Western Waterfan is listed as Special Concern under SARA and it inhabits permanent, primarily spring-fed streams in open subalpine or alpine meadows within 8 known sites across British Columbia.
