A request for assistance from the Canadian Plant Health Council



To our Entomologists, researchers, and insect enthusiasts;

The Insect Surveillance Community of Practice, established under the Canadian Plant Health Council, is exploring the creation of a community science project that would connect enthusiasts from across the country that use black light attraction and other insect traps or techniques to collect or observe insects for a variety of purposes. Insect trapping or observation can provide valuable knowledge about the health of insect populations across Canada, contribute to the early detection of invasive species, and provide data on new and emerging species. We believe that if we can provide a network effect around insect observations then we will be in much better position to improve insect management or conservation decision-making to protect the health of plants across Canada

As a first step, we would like to gather information on how black light and other insect traps are being used across the country to potentially identify opportunities to create additional networks for insect monitoring, including for the detection of key insect species of concern.
