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Mosquitoes Beware: Bats Have Your Number



FRASER VALLEY, UPPER SUNSHINE COAST and TEXADA ISLAND BC.

Did you know that a Little Brown Myotis can eat 600 mosquitoes in an hour? Not only do bats devour mosquitoes, but the bats of BC also eat other night-time insects that are considered pests to the agricultural and forest industries. "Smaller bat species eat the smaller insects, while larger bat species eat larger beetles and

moths, including cucumber beetles, June bugs, stinkbugs, and Spruce Budworm," says Aimee Mitchell, Fraser Valley and Upper Sunshine Coast/Texada Island Community Bat Program coordinator. "We have at least 15 species of bats in BC and they all provide free and natural insect pest control services for the community." **READ MORE**

Our vibrant ecosystem is under threat.

BC is also home to Canada's largest and busiest port and the expanded Trans Mountain Pipeline—both driving up vessel traffic and underwater noise levels known to harm and even be fatal to marine life. Not to mention, projects like Woodfibre LNG and the proposed Tilbury LNG—expected to begin filling tankers by 2028—could contribute to a

projected 6,600 tanker voyages through the Salish Sea by 2053, with Tilbury alone adding 68 tanker trips annually, according to a recent <u>report</u> by Stand.earth. This would lead to an exponential increase in tanker traffic within the Salish Sea, creating inconceivable amounts of noise pollution, a dramatic increase of oil spill and collision risks, plus a myriad of other harmful effects.
